# Your gift in good hands


In the financial year to 31 July 2015 the College received revenues of  $\pm$ 10.0 million, unchanged from the previous year. The operating costs were  $\pm$ 9.9 million, providing a modest surplus of  $\pm$ 0.1 million.

A third of the College's costs are financed from investment returns. The College's endowment grew to £113 million, benefitting from rising stock and property markets, and £0.7 million of capital donations. We remain very grateful to the alumni who sit on the Investment Advisory Committee, providing their considerable asset management experience and expertise to the College *gratis*.

During the 2014-15 year the College undertook the first phase of a major project to renovate the Cloisters, in order to create a new Reading Room linked to the Library above. This project has continued to grow over the last year and we are nearing our goal of providing much needed study space for students (at their request!) and also a new modern archive facility in the basement underneath the Stoker Room. Donations of £1.1 million for this project were received in 2014-15 and further pledges of £3.0 million were made towards the full cost of £4.3 million.





### **HCR**

Thanks to the generosity of Annual Fund donors, Kartika (MSc International Health and Tropical Medicine) spent two months in Laos undertaking a systematic review on the quality of antidiabetic medicine within the Oxford Tropical Network.

In 2015, it is estimated that there were 415 million people affected by diabetes worldwide, and in 2040 it is expected to rise to 642 million. The quality of medicine varies dramatically across the world, with the proportion of counterfeit medicine reaching over 30% of the circulating medicine in developing countries. A worrying statistic.



Thanks to the support of Brasenose donors, Kartika got the chance to be involved with the unit's activity; learning how to conduct ground-breaking research and how to make a real difference to public health in the developing world. She says: "It taught me that, even when resource is limited, we can still undertake good quality research as long as we are creative."


#### UNDERGRADUATE ROOM

First years, Rachel and Ben, where supported by the Annual Fund to investigate the refugee situation in Denmark. They travelled to a tiny village called Ræhr, where a school has been converted into a learning centre for asylum-seekers. While there, they joined a class for those who had recently been granted refugee status by the government.

Ben and Rachel explain: "The class comprised several Syrians, one Afghan and a Sri Lankan. They all had stories of escaping from violence, and it was surprising to hear what Ruben, the Sri Lankan, had been through. They all had the same response to our questions of how they arrived in Denmark: by any means possible. And they answered in similar uniformity to questions of "why Denmark?": they simply wanted to go where they could live without violence.

"We also visited a tent camp in Thisted; an eye-opening experience. Life in the camp looked more materially tolerable than might be expected: the tents had Wi-Fi and heating, and there were activities run throughout the week. It seemed to be the mental struggles that

affect life there. Despite the efforts of camp staff, there's little to do most of the time. As a result, many of the residents simply lie in their beds all day and feel severely depressed.

"Having called our generous alumni in our recent telephone campaign, we know more than most the impact that you have at BNC. Our trip to Denmark was unforgettable. Meeting the individual refugees, usually presented as a mass crowd on TV, gave us a lot of perspective on the crisis as a whole. The lengths they had gone to in the hope of one day having lives even a fraction as comfortable as our own was astonishing, and something that will stick with us throughout our time at BNC and beyond. Thank you for giving us this amazing opportunity."

Brasenose College's historic library was designed in the seventeenth century to house 2,300 books and to be used by 28 Fellows. Today, the original space is required to serve over 60 Fellows, 550 students and 60,000 books.

After winning his place to compete

with the Oxford 1st team, attention turned to the main event: The Varsity Races. These consist of two runs of Giant Slalom (GS) in the morning, one run of Slalom in the early afternoon, and one run of floodlit Night Slalom in the evening.

Both Oxford Blues teams put in strong first runs in the GS, with the men holding 1st, 2nd, 5th and 7th positions on the leaderboard. The second run of the GS gave a similar result, leaving the Cambridge Mens' Blues trailing by 20 seconds going into the Slalom. In fact, Oxford gave a stellar performance all round, taking 4 wins out of 6 teams, resulting in a resounding overall win.
